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PETTIWARD HALL FINANCES

The Pettward Hall is a valuable community asset and is well used by a number of village organisations and individuals who pay hiring fees according to a scale which is revised from time to time. The Pettward Hall Management Committee at the time of setting the rates, always take into account the importance of supporting village activities. Consequently they attempt to select rates which will not cause financial embarrassment to the organisations or individuals. This policy means that the hiring fees collected during the year are about £200 less than the Hall's running expenses. The deficit must be made up from fund raising activities, and demonstrates the importance of supporting the efforts of a relatively small group of dedicated people who regularly organise events. Please recognise their efforts in keeping the Hall available to us by supporting them at future events.

The Committee has been pursuing a policy of improvements to the Hall to make it more attractive. These are funded by sources independent of the day-to-day finances. The money for the improvements comes from two grants. The first provided by the Parish Council who levy a parish rate specifically for this purpose. Part of this grant goes to repaying a loan negotiated with the National Association of Village Halls. The second was a 'one-off' grant from Mid Suffolk District Council.

Already two toilets have been provided and the Hall redecorated. Work is currently taking place on a bar and serving area and plans are in hand to provide curtains for the stage and access from the Main Hall to the lower room. Whilst the main items have been carried out professionally, we have been fortunate in receiving assistance from the Probation Service and individuals in the parish which has enabled us to stretch our limited resources.
