ENVIRONMENTAL NEWS

"Food for the heart" is a healthy eating
campaign which is part of the Health Education
authority and Department of Health's "Look
after your heart" programme. The main mes-
sages of the campaign are :-

- Eat less fat, especially saturated fat.
- Eat more fibre rich, starchy foods.
- Simple dietary changes can significantly
reduce the risk of coronary heart disease.

Mid Suffolk District Council, Suffolk County
Council and East Suffolk Health Authority are
organising a Health day on October 5th at Need-
ham Market Middle school between 10.00am -
4.00 pm. There should something of interest for
everyone, including :-

- Health checks - blood pressure, carbon
monoxide and fitness testing.

There will also be activities that people can
participate in such as dance/fitness. A series of
talks will take place throughout the day cover-
ing topics such as osteoporosis and the meno-
pause, life-style and posture, stress and
relaxation, healthy eating and colour co-ordina-
tion. For the children there should be a bouncy

castle, battery cars, a play area, balloons, as well
as a giant penguin and mouse.

A VALID COMPLAINT: THE BUS SERVICE

Two days into the new school term, the bus service for children to the High school in Stowmarket that live under a three mile limit has been stopped. No prior notice was given. Now 17 children will have to make their own way to school, with winter just round the corner.

The road to the High school has many dangers, no street lighting or pavements. Many children have no lockers at school and have to carry all their books, P.E. gear, packed lunch and sometimes musical instruments with them. Most of us feel that we do not want our children to cycle to school.
