ST.ANDREWS CHURCH (CONTINUED)

The Christingle Service is a very popular service with children, with symbolism (not to mention free oranges) that all can appreciate. As the proceeds go towards deprived children worldwide, adults find it easily understandable too.

Services on fifth Sundays are 'Benefice Services', in which the intention is that ALL regular worshippers (not just the keenites!) gather for a single service in each church in turn. Many Onehouse and Harleston worshippers were with us on the fifth Sunday in November, at our Patronal Festival. It is now our turn to 'play away' on January 31st.

Still no NEW YEAR'S RESOLUTION? Try this one. By almost every post, along with firms trying to sell me million pound printing presses, I receive letters from charities and other worthy causes. It is awful to call these junk mail, but I'm afraid that because of the desperate financial plight of the three churches and my very limited time for organising special appeals, they suffer the same fate and hardly touch the breakfast table. Would you like to have one forwarded to you? They cover everything from campaigns to alleviate leprosy to helping save choir schools. Mostly they seem either to concentrate on helping cure specific illnesses like multiple sclerosis, or help particular groups in need, such as children or old people, or more general needs, like promoting christian literature, but I do emphasise that very few are narrowly religious.

Why not have one of these appeals diverted to you, so that you can send it back with a few bob inside? Better still, you might like to organise a coffee morning and send in the proceeds. Never mind if you've never organised one before. People like an excuse to go to someone's for a coffee, especially if it is in a good cause. You don't have to raise hundreds of pounds. You know that three or four pounds is better than the appeals going unanswered as they are now. We'll tell you how to organise a coffee morning, and as a service by the church would supply you with printed invitations to make it look more of a 'proper do'.

Please think about it. If you would like to have a go, send me (or leave at the church) a stamped addressed envelope, with the subject of your interest pencilled on the back. It may be specific, like 'cot deaths', or general, like 'anything with children' or, if you are a real hero and are willing to take pot luck, just write 'any cause'. You may not hear anything for months. I would be most grateful, though, as I hate rejecting genuine appeals, as most of them seem to be.

Points from the November meeting

The Parish rate for 1988-89 will be 4.9p in the £ - the fourth consecutive year at this level. This will raise the sum of £2,250 for Parish Council purposes including £600 for grant to the Hall Committee for any improvement work.

Council agreed to adopt Mr. Townsley's suggestion that there be a public session at the commencement of each Council meeting so that parishioners can come and give their views and comments on matters to be considered by the Council.

Prior to the meeting, Mr. Kistner, Chief Financial Officer of the Mid Suffolk District Council gave a talk on District Council finance and the proposed rates reforms.
