

#### **Great Finborough Community Council**

At the meeting on 25 March 2008 some of the issues discussed included:

- The development of the Children's Play Area and Car Park following a liaison meeting with the developer, Gipping Homes; and naming of the new roads in the village..
- Gal Travis was to attend the Youth Committee (rescheduled from 2<sup>nd</sup> to 9<sup>th</sup> April) to advise on the grant application to be made for upgrading of football pitch and possibility of a skateboard bowl. The Youth Café has had more adults volunteering to supervise. There was discussion about Simon Sinclair's interest in forging closing links between Finborough School and the village community.
- The construction of the footway serving Pettiward Hall, and the task group's work on the future of Pettiward Hall. A full options appraisal is to be undertaken.

**Flood Risk Information** - River levels locally rose rapidly during the weekend of March 15/16, threatening floods in low-lying parts. If you are in a low-lying area, you can keep informed when there is a risk by calling the Floodline on 0845 988 1188. The Rattlesden River information is accessed by 0 3 5 4 4 2 6.

**Local Councils in Suffolk** - You may have heard that Mid Suffolk District Council favours a single council for the whole of Suffolk. I do not support that view, as it would be far too large. There is a good case for three or four councils, working in a partnership as necessary on some services. Please get in touch if you would like to read my views in more detail, or to pass on your own opinion.

Aircraft Flight Paths and Stacking – NATS - The proposal to stack over Suffolk aircraft awaiting permission to land at Stansted is a concern. The area to be designated is an oval

between Blakenham and Cockfield, and includes Little Finborough. Some additional noise would be inevitable. #### **Housing Development Off Middlefield Drive**

As you will no doubt have noticed, development works are underway in earnest following resolution of the numerous planning and technical issues that accompany a development of this nature and delays caused by wet weather. Following the commitment made at the time we acquired this site, we have sought to work closely with the Parish Council so as to ensure, as far as we can, that the new Community facilities we are providing fully meet the general requirements of the village. We have also sought to keep disruption and inconvenience to a minimum by communication, discussion and careful planning. To this end we are particularly grateful to those Parish Councillors and near neighbours who have acted as representatives of the village at our regular liaison meetings.

Currently we are concentrating on the site infrastructure works which encompass new and diverted sewers, extension of the public roads and reversion of overhead cables to underground. At the same time we have commenced an initial phase of 12 properties.

Works will shortly commence on the new village car park and playground and we intend to involve both schools in the village and encourage participation and interest in the project. To this end we are very fortunate to be able to make use of the extensive resources available through the Construction

Industry Training Board who have agreed to support the education project. One area where we hope that the children will take a particular interest is in respect of the two properties that we are looking to develop as "Eco Homes". These will allow us to contribute to the efforts that have to be made as energy resources become increasingly scarce and more expensive at a time when respect for the environment and ecology is so topical.

In spite of the apparent downturn in the housing market we have received numerous expressions of interest from people wanting to be advised when the first phase is released. Hopefully this will be Summer 2008. Should anybody else wish to be added to this list then please contact us.

Finally, security and safety are amongst our primary concerns and we would appreciate any help that the village can give us by way of feedback in connection with any suspicious activities and, most importantly, by ensuring that children keep away from the site at all times.

Suffolk County Council is working with district and parish councils and partners to improve community safety and tackle anti-social behaviour problems across the county, and local people are being encouraged to play their part in making Suffolk safer.

Have you ever thought that while improving your garden you could be making your property a little safer with plants that are unfriendly to intruders and burglars?

There are various hedging plants and shrubs that have defensive systems and will form dense and thorny barriers which will help to protect your property if grown along boundaries, near windows or against walls and fences.

Burglars particularly dislike prickly plants and an accidental brush with a thorn may leave DNA and fragments at the scene of the crime. Hedges are particularly useful in protecting the boundary of your garden.

Native species that are most suitable and help biodiversity include: beech, blackthorn, box escallonia, field maple, hawthorn, hazel, holly, hornbeam privet, pyracantha and yew. Mixed hedges containing some of these species can be designed to suit the location and create a strong boundary, creating shelter and security.

Thorny shrubs that can be used to form dense borders include: barberry/berberis, firethorn/pyracantha, shrub rose/rosa rugosa, gorse/genista hispanica and ornamental bramble/rubus.

Shrubs which form dense thickets and growth include: cotoneaster conspicuous 'decorus' and other taller species, elaeagnus x ebbingei and e angustifolia, flowering currant

/ribes, symphorcarpus chenaultii 'hancock', lonicera pileata and prunus laurocerasus


#### Race of the Boggmen - 2008

LETS stands for LOCAL EXCHANGE TRADING SCHEME. We trade skills, produce and favours for Talents.



#### Where the wild things are.....

Sorrel, an interesting little herb which grows in abundance locally, is really getting into gear in May. If you haven't met it before, why not give it a try. It's acidic, lemony and packed with vitamins A, B1 and C. Half a dozen leaves will liven up a mixed green salad. Try some chopped and sprinkled on an omelette - the sharpness of sorrel balances the richness of the

omelette, especially a cheese one. Sorrel sauce has long been a traditional partner to fish dishes. The following recipe for sorrel and wild garlic soup is also good as a sauce. Just don't expect its bright green colour to stay like that when cooked.

So where do you find sorrel and wild garlic? **Wild garlic** (Ramsons) grows down by The Wash and other damp shady places usually from April to June. It has broad strap like leaves, clusters of little white flowers and a typical smell of onion. **Sorrel** grows prolifically in our churchyard throughout the spring and summer and you are very welcome to come and help yourself as often as you like. It grows all the better for being picked regularly. If you need help in identifying it, come along on a Saturday morning between 10.30 and 12 noon and we will be delighted to help you. You would also be most welcome to join us for a cup of coffee and a biscuit.

#### Sorrel, potato and wild garlic soup

50g butter

1 small onion, finely chopped

1 large potato (about 250g) peeled, cut into small pieces 300g sorrel

1 big handful wild garlic leaves, well washed

400ml vegetable or chicken stock

115ml crème fraiche or cream

salt and pepper if required

Heat the butter in a saucepan, add the onion and fry gently until translucent but not brown. Add the stock and potato; cook until soft. Then add the wild garlic leaves and sorrel for 4-5 minutes. Whizz in a food processor or blender; adjust seasoning and add crème fraiche or cream. Serve hot or cold. Can be reheated but do not actually boil once the cream has been added.

The couple returned to give us lots of ideas to help us make the most of confined and small spaces.

The next meeting will be the AGM with a Bring and Buy Plant Sale and Social on May 8 at 7.30pm in the Upper Room of the Pettiward Hall. So pot on all those extra seedlings and cuttings and bring them along to find them a new home. Perhaps you will find yourself some plants that you have not grown before; didn't think to grow this year; or lost in the recent cold wintry weather. Importantly, the AGM needs to decide on which Charity we will support this year, so if you have any suggestions let me know before the AGM gets underway. #### **From the Ministry Team**

Easter day was very early; snowfall reinforcing the fact. The following festivals are consequently early too. Ascension Day on 1 May marks the departure of Jesus from local, visible presence on earth to reign in heaven, having triumphed over evil and death. Ten days later, Pentecost (Whitsun) celebrates God's gift of the strengthening power of the Holy Spirit on all who would follow Jesus. This is to assist them in the task of

building the Kingdom for which we pray in the Lord's Prayer and must work for however we can. In addition we have Bank Holidays to top and tail the month, and given some real Spring weather we can enjoy those too.

I recently visited the magnificently restored St Pancras station in London from which Eurostar trains now run over the new high-speed line to the Channel Tunnel, whisking travellers to Paris in as little as 2½ hours and Brussels in slightly less. Just to see it and absorb the buzz makes one very aware of how close we are to our European neighbours.

The station's name comes from its site in the ancient parish of St Pancras, whose present church stands opposite. Pancras was a youth originally from Asia Minor martyred in Rome in the 4<sup>th</sup> century. There are only a handful of churches bearing his name in England: the Roman Catholic one in central Ipswich is a nearby example. On a previous visit I was welcomed at St Pancras' Church, Euston Road, by Mr Chris Nottage. He told me he was a former pupil of Stowmarket Grammar School and his father was once was curate in Great Finborough!

Some within our churches are worried about what they see as threats from advancing Islam and aggressive secularism. A short book, available in Stowmarket library (*What is the Point of Being a Christian Today*? by Timothy Radcliffe O.P) contends that the point is that the Christian faith is true. 


