

News from the Parish Council

Village Precept

At its January meeting, the Parish Council considered the precept (ie. the Parish component of the rates) that would apply to households during 2010. As in a number of recent previous years, it was agreed that the level of precept should remain unchanged. Given the increased number of properties in the village, this means that the Parish rate for individual households will fall in real terms and, for most, will only be around 50 pence a week.

Village Caretakers

I'm very pleased to confirm that we now have two part-time Village Caretakers. Matt Goodwin and Nigel Pinney both live in the village and many residents will know them. They will do one week on and one week off respectively and will be responsible for locking up the Play Area, Hall cleaning, co-ordinating village tidiness, grass cutting and some maintenance jobs.

I'd also like to take the opportunity to thank all those volunteers who have locked and unlocked the play area until now, as well as Vivian Brice because I volunteered her to clean the Pettward Hall; a job she has done on a voluntary basis for around three years.

5-A-Side Football Pitch

By the time you read this, we will have specified to Gipping Homes what we want to see around the 5-a-side football pitch. Consultation with likely users has taken place so that we end up with a facility that our older young people will want to use. Costs and grant availability are obvious factors, but potentially we're looking at an all-weather multi-sports pitch as well as a shelter on the lower field. The current expectation – with a fair wind - is that this new facility should be available around the end of the Summer or in early Autumn 2010.

Allotments

The Parish Council has received a request for the provision of allotments in the village, which in general, it supports. Identifying suitable pieces of land and the potential for acquisition or renting has begun.

Pettiward Hall

A feasibility study, involving an architect who specialises in updating public buildings, has begun as the first steps in identifying what we, as a community, want from the Hall going forward. Consultation has begun with user groups as a prelude to drawing up 'first cut' plans on which everyone will have the opportunity to comment during a forthcoming public forum whose date is to be arranged.

Village appraisal

Having received completed appraisal questionnaires, we are now in the process of analysing the data obtained. This is quite a sizeable task, but will lead to us being able to feed back the survey outcomes later this year and then act on them over the foreseeable future.

Future dates

The next Parish Council meetings will be held at 7.30pm on 1 March and 10 May 2010 in Pettiward Hall. All welcome to attend. **Richard Brice**

News from your District Councillor

Twin Bin Recycling and Waste

Mid Suffolk District Council is grateful for people's patience and understanding during what has been a very difficult snowy three weeks.

Christmas Tree Recycling

These will go up on 1 April but Sunday charges will not be introduced.

Local Government Reorganisation (LGR)

By the time you read this, there should have been an announcement that

new Unitary Councils are to be formed, or not.

Mid Suffolk & Babergh Councils

Councillors have approved further integration of services provided by the two councils, with a target of a joint organisation and management by 1 April 2011. This decision stems from frustration with the delays over LGR, and the need to contain and reduce council spending. Green Party councillors welcome the move to more partnership with Babergh, as it is similar to our proposal to the Boundary Committee to form a Unitary Council from the two authorities. Either way, we suggest a new council should be called 'Heart of Suffolk Council'

Cutting your Carbon Footprint

Householders can access the Carbon Reduction Initiative by calling 0800 232 1677 for free or by visiting www.easterncri.org. The system is completed by giving a preferred installer that is based in the area, minimising carbon footprints and information is available of preferential local offers.

Tree Planting at Paupers' Graves

Onehouse Parish Council asked for help to strengthen the boundaries of its woodland at Paupers Graves with additional hedge planting. I was pleased to be able to match this with a request from Stowmarket High School for outdoor community projects. In an all-day task on 6 November, 100 trees (mostly saved and donated by local people from Onehouse and nearby villages) were planted by a team of 15 pupils, and protected with tree guards also donated locally.

Stowmarket Plan Suffers Setback

The saga of the Stowmarket Area Action Plan (SAAP) has been extended for a further 6 months, due to Government dissatisfaction with some aspects of the draft published last November. It criticised the increase in proposed housing numbers from 1400 to 2000 without sufficient justification or specific locations for brown-field building (homes on previously developed land). Plans for increased employment land and shopping areas had also not been adequately justified.

As a result a further draft is being prepared. The work will be overseen by a small panel of councillors, including me. Planning officers will seek to better justify what they have put forward, but as your representative I will continue to argue for reduced numbers and phasing which ensures building on Chilton Leys does not begin until it is genuinely necessary because Cedars Park and Ashes Farm developments are nearing completion.

The new Submission Draft should be available for public comment from 12 April to 24 May. Onehouse Parish Council has arranged a Councillors Surgery for 17 April to make the new material available in the village.

Budget and Council Tax Bills

Half the money MSDC spends comes from Government, and half from your Council Tax. As Government has only increased their grant by 0.5%, there is pressure on our budget and some price rises and service cuts are inevitable even if Council tax goes up 3%, the working assumption so far. Your total bill will include elements for County Council and the Police, so the overall effect may be more or less than 3%.

Wintry Weather

Gritting information from Suffolk County Council

- Nearly three weeks of sub zero temperatures in Suffolk has put unprecedented pressure on the winter maintenance team at Suffolk County Council
- From Wednesday 6 January Suffolk County Council will salt its priority 1 routes, which includes A and B roads in the county and routes to main hospitals and fire stations and routes with more than 4,000 movements a day, but will not salt other roads.
- The priority 1 routes cover almost a third of the county's roads (1232 miles out of 4272 miles of road in the county)
- We will continue to fill grit bins in the county on request from parish councils so local people can treat local trouble spots on minor roads, which otherwise would not be treated
- Supplies of salt are now being diverted to local authorities in the north whose stocks are completely exhausted. With this in mind we need to make sure we use the salt we have in the most effective and efficient way. We have stocks of salt at present, but we need to be prudent to ensure that we are able to continue to grit the priority routes
- People need to take care on roads, pavements and in parks – even if places have been gritted, or appear clear of snow, there may still be icy patches.

NHS Suffolk advice for keeping healthy, particularly for older people

- Dress warmly with several light layers of clothing and thermal underwear and wear a hat
- Wear warm, dry, flat, non-slip shoes or boots, especially in icy conditions
- In bed use several light layers. It is a good idea wear bed socks, a night cap, thermal underwear and pyjamas in bed
- Move your bed or chairs away from cold exterior walls
- Eat at least one hot meal a day; have regular warm drinks and soup
- Stock up on essential foods in case of an emergency
- Stay as active as you can.

Soothing painful joints: *What causes the pain?*

When joint tissues have been damaged, the body activates the inflammation response to limit and repair the damage. Blood flow increases to the painful area, which creates heat, redness and the swelling. The nerve endings are stimulated causing pain signals to bring the problem to our attention and limit our movement, preventing us aggravating the injury further.

Why doesn't the pain stop?

In some cases, the inflammation response doesn't switch off as with rheumatoid arthritis. With gout, the pain can go but return with a build up of uric acid crystals near a joint. In osteoarthritis, wear and tear has caused the bone structure at a joint to change. This prevents the easy flow of blood and tissue fluids and the build up continues to aggravate the nerves causing pain. After muscular injury or after an operation, scar tissue may develop which inhibits normal movement in the area and again causes pain.

Acupuncture reduces pain

Swine Flu vaccination: Children 6 months to 5 years


Young children are being vaccinated against swine flu in Suffolk. Those born between 1 January 2005 and 7 June 2009 plus babies who attain 6 months of age during the vaccination programme will be included.

Some of the GP practices that have already finished vaccinating people in the first at-risk groups have started vaccinating children in this age group in Suffolk. Now all these family doctor practices will start to contact and vaccinate these children.

Swine Flu has had less public attention recently, but it is still a major threat to public health. We don't know whether the numbers of people affected will continue to reduce or not. Young children are still very much at risk, and when they are infected some suffer severely, so this vaccination programme for the under fives is very important. Having your child vaccinated greatly improves his or her protection from the disease, but also helps to make it less likely the illness will be spread between children. Please do respond when you are contacted by your doctor's surgery asking for you to bring your children in for vaccination.



From the Ministry Team

Dear Friends,

Listening to the radio on my way to work at about 7am after the holiday I was surprised to be told that whilst there was no snow in the County at the moment, people were advised not to travel *unless absolutely necessary*. My car thermometer recorded -2°C and clearly there was ice. It was 4 January so no real surprise but I hope many heeded the warning.

This advice was well meant and within a few days we were all battenning down the hatches *but* it would have been wrong to follow the advice blindly. It is all too easy to take the soft option. We stay in our comfort zone taking no risks. With our tried and tested friends, outings, holidays, restaurants and clubs – or none. We keep our opinions formed years ago in a different world and sometimes regard those who change theirs as weak. We usually play it safe or very safe for fear ofOf what? Other people who might disagree with us? Who might dislike us? Who might do things differently? Of appearing foolish? Of making ourselves vulnerable to ridicule for our opinions?

I was reminded of the story of the woman who religiously recorded the names of the people who sent her Christmas Cards and if one year someone missed she never sent another. Eventually she sent very few. Her world had shrunk because she was not prepared to take the risk of doing or giving something to someone who might not reciprocate. She was not going to be thought *generous*. What a sad state that we might all close down to the lowest common denominator.

Christ calls us to take the risk; to step out (of line) because as the Psalmist had it all those millennia ago: 'Where there is no vision the people perish'. We as a nation are in need of a new vision and we, as village communities, must assess what it is that we are called to do and to be for each other as this new decade begins. It is not the same as twenty years ago. It is a changed world and there are many opportunities. What, I wonder, is God calling each of us to risk this year for the sake of a better world?
