Due to the ongoing Covid 19 pandemic the Parish Council meeting scheduled for 12 April at 7.30pm was held remotely via Zoom platform.

Planning – After some discussion it was decided to ask for an extension for planning application DC/21/02077, outline planning for 4 houses on land to the rear of East House in order to allow all parties time to digest the relevant information and formulate replies. A comment of "no objection" was submitted for planning application DC/21/01424, erection of garage at Drake Cottage.

Donations under S107 were awarded as follows – SARS £150, EAAA £150 and the Stowmarket Food Bank £200.

It was resolved to commission Community Action Suffolk to carry out a Local Housing Needs Survey, more of which will be covered in the June Newsletter.

It was noted that Suffolk County Council have procured a mobile speed awareness sign which uses Automatic Number Plate Recognition (ANPR). It was agreed that the Council would apply to join the scheme.

It was agreed to continue with the playground refurbishment consultation by the sending out of a questionnaire with the newsletter. See page 5 for more details.

Due to concerns over Covid 19 it was decided to hold the Annual Village meeting by the zoom platform. See page 6 for details of how to attend.

Gt Finborough Recorder's Report 2021

It's a mystery? In the beginning of March this year, the PC were contacted by a metal detectorist, Rob, who lives in Creeting St Peter. While out detecting he had come across an item with the name RG Pettiward inscribed on it. The name meant nothing to him, but fortunately his son thought it was a name associated with Finborough The PC forwarded the email to me as Local Recorder and knowing I am in contact with the last Squire's grandson, also called Charles. Roger Gamlen Pettiward was Charles's father who was killed in action at Dieppe, WW2 and is remembered in a window in the N wall of the chancel, by the altar. There is also a plaque to him in the N chapel. I contacted Charles, and it was arranged that Rob would bring me the item and I would forward it to Charles. It turned out the find was a rowing medal that Roger had won 1923 at Eton. The mystery to me is, it was found "in the Rougham/Beyton area in a field in the middle of nowhere". How did it get there? Charles's idea is that he might have had it in his pocket while out shooting or hunting (revealing their lifestyle at the time!) but it is a mystery that I do not expect we will ever find an answer to?

I mentioned earlier that I am the village Local History Recorder. I feel the time has come for me to pass this role on to somebody who is more in touch with the village. Would anyone like to take over from me? I can help you get started. You write an annual report which is put into the Suffolk Records Office, so that future Local Historians can find out about life in Finborough in the past. Sounds a bit dull, but it certainly is not, and you will find out more about our village past and present? If you think you might be interested to find out more about the role, please email me on mary-bbf@hotmail.com. (we have no phoneline at present!) Over the past 40 years I have collected together much information about Gt Finborough and its history, hoping eventually to produce a booklet about the village. I would really like someone who would work with me to put all the info I have in a more usable form, so it can be used by anyone with an interest in a particular subject. News from your District Councillor - John Matthissen

Wrong bin costs money - It is alarming to learn that entire lorry-loads of recycling are rejected because they are contaminated by a single household putting the wrong items in the green bin. Worst problem is used nappies, followed by food waste. Not only is this harmful to the environment through failed recycling, but it hits our council tax, at a cost now estimated at £1 million a year across Suffolk. If you cannot get everything in your black bin, (perhaps twins or triplets?) please request a larger bin. These are available, along with ideas for reducing waste. Tree Nursery - A reminder that any seedling native trees unwanted in vegetable and flower beds will be very welcome at the Red Gables tree nursery.

Biodiversity Gain - As local people (and their councillor) struggle to hold on to trees and hedges seen only as an inconvenience by developers, there are possibilities to make gains elsewhere. Parish Councils have received an invitation to nominate places (public or private) where Mid Suffolk can plant trees to absorb carbon and create places for birds and insects to live in future years. This also extends to areas of grass which could be treated as meadow land to promote wild flowers for pollinating insects and reduce grass growth. The project is extended to everyone, so take your ideas to your parish council or let me know.

Green Spaces - Green Group presented the following motion which was unanimously approved at the full council meeting of MSDC in March:

That the Council carries out a review of green space to ensure that it is optimising the biodiversity and wellbeing aspects of natural and amenity space in Mid Suffolk.

Green space can contribute significantly towards meeting the Council's climate change and biodiversity targets; it also contributes greatly to the health and wellbeing of residents. The data collected during the

review will feed into the work of the environmental task force set up to identify ways to reduce climate change and enhance biodiversity throughout the district.

A Trip to London

Rules from 12 April 2021 Stage two of the easing of lockdown



You can meet outdoors (including in private gardens) at a distance of 2m:

- In groups of up to six (this means one person can meet up to five others from different households)
- Or any number of people from no more than two households. (Your household is the people you live with).



What is now open to visit alone or with my household?

- All shops, hairdressers, beauty salons and gyms
- Zoos, theme parks, libraries and community centres
- Outdoor sports facilities
- Children will be able to attend any indoor children's activity, including sport



What else can I do?

- Restaurants, cafes and pubs can provide table service to customers sitting outdoors
 - Members of the same household can take a holiday in England in self-contained accommodation e.g. holiday cottages
- Weddings or wakes can be attended by up to 15 people in permitted premises



Can I travel?

- The 'Stay at Home' requirement is no longer in place, however, you should continue to work from home if you can and minimise the number of journeys you make.
- Where possible, stay local and avoid travelling at the busiest times and routes.



Can I access testing if I don't have any symptoms?

1 in 3 people with the coronavirus do not show any symptoms. Through testing we can stop the spread of the virus to other people. Go online to book a test or a home test kit at www.suffolk.gov.uk/coronaviruscovid-19/getting-a-test/ or call 0333 772 6144 (interpreters are available).



Whether you have had a vaccination or not, you can catch and pass Covid-19 onto other people, so still remember 'Hands. Face. Space':

Hands – wash your hands regularly and for 20 seconds

Face - wear a face covering over nose and mouth in indoor settings Space – stay 2 metres apart from people you do not live with where possible

From Onehouse Rectory May 2021

Two different experiences to consider this month. The first was an article I read in the Church Times of the 1 April 2021 entitled "Coming through Covid-19".

Novelist and poet, Dallin Chapman, was writing about her experiences of having had Covid twice and still having to struggle with long Covid. One of the ways she has been getting

through all this is to watch Morning Prayer from Canterbury Cathedral everyday with reflections by Dean Robert Willis. When things got really tough, she recited a phrase Dean Robert uses daily "And I give thanks for that" as a mantra. Whilst saying these words over and over again she felt her "spirits lifting".

From all this has come a beautiful poem which Dallin has given me permission to share:-

And I give thanks for that—
dawn whispering at the window
nudging memory, books by my bedside
waiting to be read,
far echoes of a kettle coming to the boil,
footsteps on the stairs.
I give thanks for that.

I give thanks for that — kindness, a doctor who took time, a nurse who ignored night to combat fear, care and circles of concern, the distant telephone.

I give thanks for that.

I give thanks for that — grasses and scent of spring,

squirrel busy on the lawn, birds enjoying our berries, faint murmur of mowing, wide morning sky, and snowdrops, the trees' ancient lullabies, *I give thanks for that*.

I give thanks for that — for life and breath, for chance to dream again of longer days, touch of loved ones' hands, of laughter and visiting old friends. For just being.

I give thanks for that.

Second experience is a reflection of mine about the death of Prince Philip. I have never had the privilege of meeting him although our son has, but I have experienced just one of the amazing schemes he set up.

During the 1960s, Prince Philip and the then Dean of Windsor, Robin Woods (later Bishop of Worcester) had the vision to establish the work of St. George's House in the grounds of Windsor Castle right next door to the beautiful St. George's Chapel where Prince Philip's funeral will take place. They realised that Church leaders and leaders in the secular world needed somewhere to come together and to be able to discuss the world and its present problems in confidence; to hear first class speakers from different walks of life and threading through it all, the spiritual life of prayer and worship in the chapel if desired.

I had the privilege of attending the last month-long Clergy Course to be held there in 2005 (the courses are now planned differently to reflect our fast-moving world) and several short courses subsequently. It was a wonderful journey of discovery for me. An opportunity to be part of a worshipping community with a daily rhythm of Communion and prayer and everyday a chance to wrestle with problems besetting our world and the church. I lived with, prayed with, chatted to and studied with people of very different lives and experiences to mine.

It was a chance to withdraw to a world where we could think our thoughts and return home renewed and strengthened for our work ahead. The Community living within the walls of Windsor Castle welcomed us and shared something of their lives with us.

During the first time I was there the 2005 London bombings took place. The Castle was closed to visitors; we were all in a form of lockdown until shortly afterwards when Her Majesty went off to visit those injured and bereaved and the orders came to reopen the castle doors once more not least so that people could sit quietly in the chapel to remember those killed and injured.

The St George's House experience was a remarkable one for me and for many others and an unforgettable one too. "And, on Saturday 17 April, I shall give thanks for that" and for the life of the man whose foresight and vision made it all possible.
