## **Great Finborough Parish Council**

A meeting of the Parish Council was held in the upstairs room of Pettiward Hall at 7.30pm on Monday 14 March.

It was noted that the Parish Council had supported the nomination of Simon Waspe to carry the torch for the Queens Platinum Jubilee Torch Relay.

It was resolved to submit the following comments to application; DC/21/00575, The Cottage, High Street. "Great Finborough Parish Council SUPPORT this application. This is an ideal conversion of a currently redundant commercial building into additional family accommodation. It is felt the proposal is sympathetic to the building and involves little change to the character and no harm to the adjacent main house"

It was RESOLVED to appoint Heelis & Lodge to carry out the Internal Audit for 2021/22. The Terms of Engagement and Audit Plan were approved.

It was noted that a car had damaged the herb garden. An invoice for repair will be provided and the driver has agreed to pay for the damages.

Middlefield Drive Play Area – The opening ceremony was a great success and thanks are extended to Penny for cutting the ribbon for us.

The request from Royal Air Force Air Cadets for Parish Council support for their project to provide a memorial to the crew of an RAF Wellington Bomber that crashed in 1941 in Great Finborough was unanimously supported. The memorial is planned to be sited next to the footpath sign on the path that runs from Valley Lane in Buxhall to Borough Lane and councillors are happy to support any planning application needed.

Housing Needs Survey – It was noted that there are some errors in the Summary Findings. These will be clarified with CAS and the full report chased.



Street Lights – A report from the SL Working Group confirmed that 75% of responders to the survey were in favour of replacing all the existing lights. It was agreed that an up dated quote for the replacement project be sought and all available funding streams will be investigated. It was noted that two columns currently sited in private gardens should be moved if possible to SCC Highway owned land during the process.

It was noted that volunteers had come forward to arrange an event to celebrate the Platinum Jubilee. It was suggested that a Working Group be set up to take this event forward with an estimated cost involved brought the council as soon as possible. Cllr Tarabella will schedule a first meeting of the PJWG.

Councillor Vacancy – Two very strong candidates had applied for the current vacancy. After much discussion it was RESOLVED to co-opt Lee Morgan to fill the vacancy.

The next meeting of the Parish Council is on Monday 11 March at 7.30pm in the upstairs meeting room of Pettiward Hall.

## **News from your District Councillor - John Matthissen**

### **Thurston Neighbourhood Plan Court Ruling**

I welcome the decision to quash the approval of 210 new homes in Thurston, which were contrary to the village's Neighbourhood Plan. The District committee decision 2 years ago was approval by 7 votes to 6, and I voted against. It is disappointing that the District has decided to appeal this Judicial Review ruling.

### **Electric buses**

Purchase and operation of two electric-powered buses, funded by MSDC, was approved as part of the annual budget. The intention is to provide some scheduled services for rural villages currently without meaningful provision. The current delivery time is around 6 months, so there will be time to install charging points and develop timetables.

### **Planning applications**

Concern continues regarding several of these. If they go to planning committee, I will be there to ensure local views are heard. If there is opposition from the parish council, I will discuss with the planning officer.

## **Food for thought or musings on fusion cooking**

Unlikely as it may seem - I was to be found in the Chestnut Horse the other Friday evening, generally minding my own business, when Simon reminded me that it had been some time since I last penned an offering for the auguste publication that is the Great Finborough Newsletter. I naturally tried to mitigate my errant behaviour, explaining that; I had been busy – flat out in fact; I had been laid low by the old war wound – flat on my back in fact; I had completely run out of anecdotes, thoughts and ideas, and also forgotten who I was and where I lived. I did, however, harbour the expectation and belief that all of these nuisances, might well cease and desist in time for the next issue. Thankfully, Simon is the most reasonable of men and, although I had the distinct impression that he was somewhat less than convinced by my catalogue of excuses, he graciously accorded me the benefit of the doubt, for which leniency I am most grateful.

We are all, I am sure, plagued by junk email. For my part, the vast majority is unceremoniously consigned to the “bin” but recently, one in particular did rather catch my eye. It was from a food wholesaler whom I have used on occasion - a recipe for Chicken Tikka Lasagne! I protested vociferously that nothing was sacred - but was authoritatively informed that this was “fusion cooking” and that I am, as usual, living in the past. What next then – Pizza Vindaloo, Toad in the Paella with Naan Bread or even perhaps, looking ahead to those long, languorous summer barbecues to come, a refreshing ice-cold Welsh Rarebit, on a bed of Guacamole, with a Sushi garnish and a side of Jelly Beans?

As to living in the past, and with all due deference to Jethro Tull’s 1969 masterpiece, this accusation brought to mind an event from the mid 1950s, when my Dad, having called at our local grocer’s to place the weekly order, rather uncharacteristically returned home mightily enthused, having discovered that the worthy emporium now stocked an extensive range of “continental” food. This was a time of course, when rationing had only recently loose’d its grip upon the nation, and

when the prospect of anything “foreign” was viewed with either deep suspicion, or conversely, as being invested with a mysterious and exciting allure. Continental food, happily, fell very much into the latter category making the prospect nothing short of thrilling – it all had so much more flavour than our dull, bland diet – or so the received wisdom would have us believe. Dad’s inspiration was such that he proclaimed his intent to make the necessary purchases the following Saturday, and personally to prepare a continental meal for the edification and delight of the whole family; an enticing prospect that my younger brother and I looked forward to with eager anticipation.

We lived at the time with my paternal grandmother (Nan) who, throughout her working life, had been a cook, in service with well to do military family in Cheyne Walk, Chelsea. Indeed, she still carried on in much the same vein, running the household in strict adherence to Mrs Beeton’s book of rules but, on the plus side, her culinary skills were second to none. She had a repertoire of suet puddings, both sweet and savoury, that was nothing short of stunning. Steak and Kidney pudding was at once both my greatest favourite, and my cruellest tormentor! The filling, comprised of shin of beef, kidneys, carrots, onions, celery, and sundry flavourings, was simmered very slowly, throughout the whole of the day preceding its featuring on the menu, and the aroma would pervade the entire house. This routinely drove me to distraction, knowing that it would not be available for consumption until the following lunchtime at the earliest - a veritable eternity for a lad of tender years and healthy appetite.

J. K. Jerome would probably have been proud of the preceding digression but the point I was endeavouring to make, before the Steak and Kidney pudding distracted me so effectively, was that the kitchen was Nan’s exclusive province and she guarded its borders vigilantly. So, it was the case that even if it had been with the most laudable of intentions, Dad would have faced considerable opposition, in attempting to negotiate permission for the use of the kitchen for his proposed extravaganza but, given that it was to be specifically for the preparation of foreign food, he could reasonably have been expected

to be on a hiding to nothing. Contrary to all such expectations however, he somehow succeeded, albeit that the means by which he did so, remain a secret to this day. How did it go? Find out next month....

## **Great Finborough Garden Club**

Our March meeting was a fascinating talk by Jim Paine from The Walnut Tree Nursery near Attleborough. He was speaking about the gardening definition of shade, how the surroundings in the garden can produce shade in unexpected places and how it affects the plants we can grow. He also gave us some recommendations as to how we can extend the range of plants that will tolerate shady conditions by improving the soil, lifting the crowns of overhanging trees and shrubs and improving the soil moisture levels.

The next meeting on 8 April will be a talk by Sally Bendall who owns the popular Hollowtrees Farm Shop. She will be giving us the insiders view on running this large and varied local business.

The May Car Share, has been booked for the afternoon of Thursday 26 May. We are going to Pulham Cottage which is very local being just a 10 minute drive away and is a relaxed cottage garden set in 1½ acres, created over the last 5 years. It is divided into rooms using mixed hedging, hazel fencing and vintage iron gates and fencing. It has a clipped box parterre, a kitchen garden with flowers for cutting, orchard and wildflower areas to explore. There are also areas left for re-wilding to encourage moths, butterflies and bees, a Victorian style greenhouse, orchard and free-range chickens. Plus, lots of seating to relax and enjoy the vistas and views. The price per person is £8 and this includes tea and cake. Cars to leave the village car park at 2pm. 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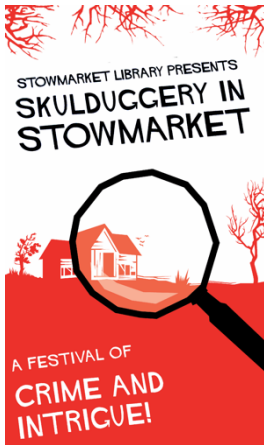

**Help support and rebuild your NHS – call out for NHS reservists**



A call out is being made for former health and care staff across Suffolk and north East Essex to register their interest in becoming an NHS reservist. There are a wide range of opportunities available, including assisting people who are being discharged from hospital or as part of the ongoing NHS COVID-19 vaccination programme.

Anyone who has previously worked in health and care is encouraged to register, with interest sought from all former staff members such as

administrators, care assistants, GPs, nurses, physiotherapists, paramedics and pharmacists. Those interested may have retired from their roles or still be working but in a different sector.

Full training will be provided, and NHS reservists will be paid in line with the role they are doing. Support will also be given by existing full-time staff that they can 'buddy up' with before starting any role. Although time commitment will vary it is anticipated to be around 30 days each year.

Local hospitals and NHS services can then call on the 'NHS reservist community' depending on their staffing requirements and pressures in their area, creating a bank of extra resource for when it is needed. Following this initial call-out for former health and care staff, it is anticipated that in the coming months people from all backgrounds and experiences will be asked to register their interest.

Amanda Lyes, Director of Workforce for the Suffolk and North East Essex Integrated Care System, said: "Over the past two years of the pandemic former health care workers and volunteers have played an invaluable role in ensuring our local vaccination programme has been one of the very best in the country.

"As our NHS starts to rebuild itself, both locally and nationally, there's now a need for NHS reservists to support that recovery.

"We ask people to help their local NHS regain the ground lost during the pandemic, and help to tackle the backlog and support the continued delivery of the vaccination programme."

## Heading up the 'responsible team'

Who is responsible for the village? Making sure the grass gets cut, the litter gets picked up, that the street lights are working? Looking at every planning application that affects us? Planning the maintenance of the trees and hedgerows, and all the facilities put in place for our pleasure. Well, that would be the parish council, of course! Our parish council is made up of 8 people who share these responsibilities. Our current chairperson is Simon Tarabella, the latest resident whose profile is being shared in this series. Simon was 4 years on the parish council before becoming the chair. His term of office will end in May 2023.

Simon moved to the village 8 years ago from Gosport, Hampshire, because he and his wife Jacqueline were looking to move closer to children and grandchildren. Whilst waiting to view Maple Lodge they happened to meet the Rev Chris Childs looking at the noticeboard outside Pettiward Hall. Chris introduced himself and his outgoing personality (along with the house being 4 doors from the Chestnut Horse) tipped the scales in our direction. Well done Chris.

Simon moved around in his childhood because of his father's work in the cement industry, but spent most of it in Nottinghamshire. He completed his education in Dunstable, joining the Royal Navy at sixteen. He describes having loved every minute of the next 36 years he spent in the Navy. If you listen to the stories of his world travels, it is clear to see why. He played different sports on different ships in different countries, and retains a commitment to physical health and sport. Life is regimented in all the armed forces but his real motivation for involving himself in contributing actively to village life came from his parents. Both did voluntary work in their communities, running the Scouts and the Guides and serving on various church and local group committees. This, he says, taught him that "doing your bit" helps build communities. Simon and Jacqueline have been together for 16 years although they first met almost 41 years ago when Simon joined the Navy with her brother Clive who he served with for the next 8 years and they became good friends. She supports Simon in many of his

endeavours and they enjoy travelling in their motorhome together and attempting to play golf (his words!).

Simon gives up a huge amount of time to his work on the parish council and, in common with all councillors, it is unpaid. He has personally driven the refurbishment of the children's play park in the centre of the village. Thanks to Simon, nearly the full cost of the £70,000 refurbishment was funded through grants and donations rather than from the parish council's own funds. It was his idea to run the Smartie challenge, with local people invited to fill a Smartie tube with pound coins. This smashing idea raised £1,500 on its own. Grace Gemmill's craft group and Delia Prior's Preschool also made contributions. The main grants came from the Lottery Fund and Viridor. The playpark reopened on 26 March 2022, providing a vital facility for children in the village.

Simon and the parish council have, of course, been involved in many other projects including Woodpecker Hill, the wildflower meadow, the housing needs survey, the street lighting survey, and provision of seating/benches in various locations. One that is really close to his heart is the herb garden between the village car park and his house. It delights him to see parents and children picking what they need to season the next family meal.

But Simon is not resting on his laurels in the last year or so of his leadership role. There is still the outcome of the two surveys to address, no small tasks in themselves. Of great importance is the Queen's Platinum Jubilee scheduled for the 4-6 June this year and the parish council with Simon's leadership will be making sure there is an event to mark the occasion for the benefit of the whole village. As always, anyone who would like to help, will be warmly welcome to the team.

Simon is a great supporter of The Chestnut Horse, always enjoying convivial company, but he will often say he has to leave his beer to make the dinner. One of his less obvious attributes is his great skill in the kitchen which he puts down to his grandfather's Italian ancestry.

He loves to experiment with new dishes and always strives for perfection both in flavour and presentation. If Simon and Jaqueline invite you for dinner then be sure to say yes as he is always a charming host and you would be in for a treat.
