

Great Finborough Parish Council

A meeting of the Parish Council was held in the upstairs room of Pettiward Hall at 7.30pm on Monday 10 January.

Norman Vendittelli's resignation was noted. Cllr Tarabella led a vote of thanks to Norman for his contribution to the Parish Council during this tenure and previous ones, his commitment to the work of the council and the community will be sorely missed.

It was agreed that a site visit be arranged with a SCC Highway Officer to look at possible positions for White Entrance Gates at the Hitcham end of High Road.

It was resolved to submit the following comments to application; DC/21/06393 Installation of all-weather football pitch to western boundary. Finborough School, The Hall, Finborough Park — "Great Finborough Parish Council have NO OBJECTION to this application based on the information available"

The Budget Working Group put forward their recommendations for the 2022/2023 budget. It was resolved to approve the budget with no further amendments. It was noted that the precept requirement raised by the budget process of £14136 showed a slight increase over the previous year resulting in an additional £2.05 per Band D household for the year. It was resolved to set the precept for 2022/2023 at £14136.

A report from the SL Working Group confirmed there had been 36 replies within the deadline date which is a 10% return rate on number of properties. 75% of responders were in favour of replacing all the existing lights. It was resolved to action a project to replace the street lighting. The Street Lighting Working Group were tasked with taking the project forward including liaison with directly affected residents to establish if any columns needed resiting and sourcing a new detailed estimate from Suffolk County Council before fund raising and grants can be secured.

A report was heard from the Middlefield Drive Play Area Working Group. Details can be found following the Parish Council report.

The next meeting of the Parish Council is on Monday 14 March at 7.30pm in the upstairs meeting room of Pettiward Hall.

Cllr Shipp will arrange refreshments to go alongside the Coffee Wagon who have agreed to do hot drinks at cost price. Cllr Shipp will invite Suffolk Radio and EADT. Pop up gazebos will be sought in case of inclement weather. Decorations such as bunting, plaque, ribbon etc will be sourced. It was agreed that Cllr Otton be asked to perform the opening.

Once again, many thanks to all who have contributed, taken part in surveys and sat on the working group committee. A great all-round village effort!

Great Finborough Link

I am interested in exploring the possibility of establishing a service in Great Finborough for the benefit of all the residents who choose to use it. Some of the case studies below highlight the sort of needs likely to exist among residents:

An elderly person living alone and wants companionship

Single partner with a toddler and no transport, keen to meet up with others in a similar position for peer support and group play

People moved into the village keen to make friends but limited in opportunities, possibly because of the pandemic

Elderly people living at home who would like to meet up with others for a coffee or to share a meal

Adult groups, chair-based exercises, yoga, walking groups, art classes

Adults who would like to go walking or dog walking with others regularly

Older adults or those with a disability who need advice on aids, equipment and how to organise their home for safety and comfort

Those newly bereaved or recently ill, who need support or practical help

People interested in working together to look after the village environment

People who need signposting to other services and opportunities.

There are lots of ways in which the village could set up a scheme that would link more of us together (either as helpers or those receiving help) and meet the needs identified. In the first instance, if anyone would be willing to meet up (in a Covid safe way) to start to shape this into a scheme, to refine the ideas and consider the feasibility of looking for some grant funding to kickstart the scheme and/or fund a coordinator, please let me or Simon Tarabella know.

Covid-19 vaccination and booster information *Some common myths*



Myth: I don't need to be vaccinated because I have already had Covid.

Response: A recent study has found that people who had not received a vaccination against Covid-19 could get catch Covid again as soon as three months later. Remember, you can also carry and spread the virus to others without knowing, even if you are feeling great and not showing any symptoms.



Myth: It's more natural to become immune by catching Covid-19

Response: We don't know how long or how strong the immunity is from catching Covid-19. What we know, is that you can catch Covid-19 again and again, if you choose not to have your vaccine. You risk being seriously ill, off work and potentially in a hospital if you wait to catch Covid-19. By getting vaccinated, you get immunity in a controlled way and most importantly, you pick the time.



Myth: I've already had both doses of the vaccine, I don't need a booster.

Response: A booster dose of the Covid-19 vaccine helps improve the protection you have from your first two doses of the vaccine. It helps give you longer-term protection against getting seriously ill from Covid-19.



Myth: I've heard you can get nasty side effects from the booster, and I don't want to be unwell for the festive period

Response: The simple answer is that it's much better to be vaccinated now and minimise the risk of becoming seriously ill. Some mild side effects are common, and you could feel unwell for a short time. Common side effects can include headache, fever and some numb pain in the arm but are usually mild, and not everyone gets them.



Myth: There's no point getting vaccinated if there's still a chance that a vaccinated person can get Covid-19.

Response: Getting vaccinated can help prevent getting sick with Covid-19. While many people with Covid-19 have only a mild illness, others may get a severe illness, or they may even die. There is no way of knowing ahead of time how Covid-19 will affect you, even if you are not at increased risk of severe complications.



Covid-19 vaccinations help protect you by training your body how to spot and fight Covid-19 without actually catching it and being ill.

From the Rectory, February 2022



I have to admit that February is probably my least favourite month of the year. Although there are small signs of spring appearing with snowdrops popping up and daytime hours slowly extending, it can feel as though the dark winter days are never-ending. And with the ongoing presence of Covid in our communities, it's all too easy to hunker down and miss out

on seeing our families and friends. Thankfully, across our benefice we have a number of regular events that can help with loneliness and isolation such as:

- Meet Up Mondays, held at Combs Church Hall, Poplar Hill, Combs Ford from 10.30am to 12.30pm. An opportunity to come together with others for tea and coffee, cake and a chat. In February they will be held on 7 and 21 February and everyone is most welcome
- Knit and Natter is also held at Combs Church Hall from 11.30am to 2pm with the next event taking place on Thursday 3 February.

- Regular coffee mornings are held at Trinity Hall, Onehouse on a Wednesday morning from 10.30am to 12pm. Prior to these events a short service of Holy Communion takes place and after that the tables come out, together with the tea, coffee and cake and the chance to catch up with friends and neighbours

There's another event I'd also like to draw your attention to. The Rural Coffee Caravan exists to help rurally isolated people in Suffolk access services and information to improve their lives, health and wellbeing, and to bring people together, empowering and strengthening rural communities. They set up in 2003 to tackle rural isolation and promote community spirit. The project was the brainchild of the Revd Canon Sally Fogden who felt very strongly that there was a need to do something to combat the stress of rural isolation. The service is free and accessible to everyone and the good news is that they will be visiting one of our parishes in February and March.

On Monday 28 February and Monday 28 March, between 2pm and 4pm, you'll find the Rural Coffee Caravan at Buxhall Village Hall. Taken from their website, this is what to expect from their visit:

- We will park up, set out tables and chairs and get the kettle on!
- We provide free refreshments and always a warm and friendly welcome!
- Our team and our volunteers love a good chat, so don't worry about coming on your own, there's always someone to talk to
- We have access to a raft of information on local and national agencies, organisations, activities and support services. If there's something on your mind then chat with us. If you've questions about what's available locally for you, we'll help you find the answers

Citizens Advice Mid Suffolk

I keep seeing on the news that my bills could be going up soon. It's making me really worried, especially as I spent more on Christmas than I should have done. How can I get my spending habits back on track in 2022?

A lot of people will be asking themselves this question right now. The good news is there are lots of things you can do to be more in control of your money and better prepared for the future.

Firstly, find out exactly what money you have coming in and going out each month. Be realistic about what you need for essentials like food and travel. Then you can set yourself a budget that you can stick totake a look at the budgeting tool on the National Citizens Advice website to help you do this. This can be found at citizensadvice.org.uk/debt-and-money/budgeting.

If any of your bills do go up in the coming year, you can go back to our budgeting tool anytime to create a new plan and stay in control. The website also has tips on how to reduce your regular living costs which you may be helpful if you find you have more money going out than coming in at any point.

If you've been using credit cards, your overdraft or store cards for your spending, it's understandable if these debts are causing you worry. It's important to prioritise paying your rent or mortgage, plus energy bills and Council Tax. Not paying these has the most serious consequences. If you need further support on this, our advisors can explain which bills you need to prioritise and the support available for paying these and other bills. We can also make sure you're getting all the income you're entitled to, such as benefits or government grants.

Boxing Day Dog Attack

At lunchtime on Boxing Day two large brown dogs were attacking our small flock of sheep grazing on our meadows in the centre of the farm. We were away for Christmas and the Barron family were kindly looking after the flock in our absence. Ivana heard dogs barking excitedly and went to investigate. She found two dogs (similar in size to Alsatians, but not Alsatians) dragging one sheep in the middle of the meadow and the rest of the sheep well scattered with several buried in hedges trying to escape. Fortunately, her shouting scared the dogs away down the meadows towards Bakers Wood / Valley Lane. It then took the family the rest of the afternoon to get all the sheep into the barn and to have the vet treat the injured ones. In all 7 sheep were injured with the one being dragged by the dogs being the most serious. The Vet did not think it would survive but fortunately, with further treatment, it has. All the ewes were in lamb and this kind of trauma can cause them to abort so we will not know until we lamb in March, the total damage caused by the dogs and their careless owner. The ewes are so traumatised, they have been difficult to get back into that meadow and even now stay up near the farm! The police were informed and were very helpful. They tell me that this has become a more common issue with the increase in dog ownership. 'Despite the publicity and education work done around this, so many people still don't seem to get it.' (Their words).

These meadows are private land on which we allow Permitted Public Access in order that the general public can enjoy the Natural and Historical Environment that we enjoy. We make nothing out of it and to have this kind of thing happen is soul destroying. The Countryside Code makes it quite clear that dogs should be under control and always kept in sight. They should be kept on a lead when near livestock. This is especially the case with sheep as they tend to run away which encourages the dogs to chase them.

We have the right to withdraw this Public Access, so it is up to all dog owners to be responsible if the majority of the public are to continue to enjoy our meadows.

The whole situation could have been so much worse if Ivana had not heard the dogs barking and gone to investigate. We are so grateful to the whole Barron family for coming to the rescue on Boxing Day. I only hope, if you own such dogs, you know where they were on Boxing Day and can honestly say your dogs were not the culprits.

Please, will all dog owners who use the meadows for walks please follow the Countryside Code and always keep your dogs under control and in sight as wildlife can also be disturbed.
