
There was no meeting of the parish Council in February.

News from your District Councillor - John Matthissen Recycling stall March 24th

The now well-established stall returns to the Market Place on $4^{\rm th}$ Thursday of the month, $9.30{\rm am}-11.30{\rm am}$. You can bring medicine 'blister' packs, toothpaste tubes and brushes, cheese wrappers and nets, pens, pencils and markers and *clean* pet food pouches. It helps a lot if you have these separated. This scheme is run by the Volunteers of Stowmarket group based at Red Gables. Soft plastics including pet food pouches can also be deposited at Tesco and Solar. Tetra-paks still need to go to the SCC household waste site.

Waste and Recycling Centre

The household waste and recycling site in Stowmarket is to be closed for re-surfacing works for 2 weeks commencing on 28th Feb. During that time waste can be taken to either Ipswich or Bury St Edmunds waste and recycling sites.

Mid Suffolk Disability Forum

The Forum is open to disabled people, their carers, representatives of disability organisations and everyone interested in disability. It meets quarterly, currently on Zoom, but otherwise at the Salvation Army centre in Violet Hill Road, Stowmarket. 

HEART OF THE VILLAGE

A pub in a village is nearly always the centre of village life and for the past 21 years that I've lived here it has been for me. But now I think the Chestnut Horse is not just the centre but the heart of the village. It has changed over the past two decades when we have had some really good landlords and some dreadful ones. So, what is different now, well I think it is because of one person and that is Sharon Shipp, our current landlady.

She is a Suffolk girl brought up in Claydon where she went to school and started work in an old people's home. At 15 she told a fib about her age to get a job looking after two small children in a "posh" house. But with this and her foundation in the old people's home she began to build up a knowledge and working practices of catering. Her first entry into self-employment was going to London selling toys and hosting Tupperware parties. Most of her working life however has been in pub work.

Sharon and her then husband Ian ran this pub from 2004 to 2007 when it was under the care (or lack of) Green King. Because of continual rising costs of their beers and the rent they decided to sell up and move on to a Free House in Chelmondiston on the Shotley peninsula.

The Chestnut Horse changed hands from Green King to Hawthorn Leisure in 2014 and after a number of different tenants it came back on the market in 2019. Sharon saw the advert for the pub and as she said "was just being nosey" and went to have a look. She has very fond memories of living in the village and was really upset when she saw the condition in which the pub had been left by the previous tenants. To have the Chestnut Horse again was a real temptation but as a single woman she never thought she had a hope of getting it but thought to herself "I'll have a go anyway". In complete secrecy, without even telling her mum she drew up a business plan and submitted it to Hawthorn Leisure. As we all know, the rest is history, and she was awarded the tenancy.

Now the really hard work began because the premises had been left in the most dreadful state. With her very good friend Anne and one of her sons Robert and his partner Clare they begin to clear up and refurbish. This was no mean task because everything had been taken away by the previous tenants including the kitchen sink. Just a quick lick of paint was not going to do it. Plumbing, electrical and building work were all needed before the scrubbing, cleaning and painting could begin.

Early September 2019 Sharon opened for business and things went well. One of her ideas was to sell Real Ales but she was more than just a little worried. Thinking that she may have to pour her profits down the drain along with the ale because of dislike for the stuff she offered an incentive. If someone drank a certain number of pints then they got a free one. It's hard to tell if the incentive worked or if the real ale was to people's liking but it flew out of the barrels and Sharon sighed with relief.

Things were going really well, the future looking bright, then Covid and the pandemic hit us all. Pubs were closing, businesses going down the pan. Sharon had to "shut shop". However, she did the exact opposite and opened a shop. She stopped buying beer and started buying food. Sourcing locally wherever she could, offering a range of produce and services. There was a takeaway service, a library with a book and toy exchange and a delivery service for those who were locked down and couldn't get out. She even bought flour in bulk and repackaged into smaller bags to help with home cooking and baking. As she points out this wasn't a "money maker", you can't compete with the likes of Tesco, but it kept her business going until restrictions were lifted. Since relaxation of restrictions, we have seen many changes and improvements both inside and out to the Chestnut Horse, not least of all the lovely extension at the back.

There are many different forms of entertainment at our pub. Themed nights with food from around the world, quizzes, live bands, stand-up

comedy, competitions, singing and poker nights. Sharon holds the trophy for poker in the league in which our pub participates.

One thing that Sharon wants to stress is just how much she appreciates the help she has had from so many people in the village to get the pub to where it is today. She says this is a lovely village and the help that friends and staff have given over the last two years is overwhelming. Thank you to you all.

From the Rectory, March 2022



The season of Lent is upon us, beginning on the 2 March with Ash Wednesday. Firstly though, I hope you will be able to enjoy Pancake Day, otherwise known as Shrove Tuesday, which this year falls on the 11 March and gives us the opportunity to have a feast by using up flour, eggs and butter to make

pancakes before the traditional Lenten fast begins. But what is Lent exactly and why do people try and give up things during this period?

Lent runs until Holy Saturday, the day before Easter Sunday (which this year falls on the 17 April). It's a period that represents the 40 days Jesus fasted in the desert and opposed the temptations offered by the devil before his crucifixion in Jerusalem which Christians commemorate on Good Friday. The purpose of Lent is for people of faith to prepare for Easter and the risen Christ and this has traditionally been done by prayer, fasting and almsgiving to replicate the experiences of Jesus in the desert.

Now I expect that most of us have at one time or another decided to give up something we really enjoy for Lent. For me it tends to be chocolate or cake but it could be all sorts of things such as spending too much time on our electronic devices, a favourite food or drink or binge-watching TV box sets. The important thing is that whatever we decide to give up for Lent, we do so with the right intention and understanding that it helps us to prepare for Easter.

Another practice that Christians will often include as part of their Lenten preparations is that of prayer and spiritual reflection. This can be done individually or in a group specifically set up for that purpose. Within

the Benefice the beginning of Lent will be marked by a church service on Ash Wednesday, 2 March, at Trinity Hall in Onehouse. Often at services on this day there is the opportunity to have ashes, mixed with oil, marked on your forehead in the shape of a cross. This is to remind us of the sins we have committed and to encourage us, during Lent, to reflect on how to repent for those sins and grow in holiness so that we're ready to joyfully celebrate the resurrection of Jesus Christ on Easter Sunday. Throughout the period of Lent, on Wednesday evenings at the Rectory (9, 16, 23, 30 March and 6 April) and on Thursday mornings (10, 17, 24, 31 March and 7 April) on Zoom, there will be an opportunity to join one of our Lent study groups when we'll be using the #Live Lent Embracing Justice booklet prepared by the Church of England. Please email revdsarahjenkins@gmail.com if you'd like to know more.

One final activity that Christians are encouraged to do during Lent is to give alms. However, this doesn't just mean putting money in a collection box or donating via an on-line giving website. Giving alms can encompass a wide range of activities, it could be buying extra shopping and donating it to the local food bank, offering your time to help an elderly neighbour or volunteering for a charity. There are a multitude of ways in which to give alms and by spending a little time looking at what you could do, it will become clear that the people who are most in need will be helped by your generosity.

I do hope you enjoy your pancakes on Shrove Tuesday and that these words have given you food for thought about the period of Lent.


