News from your District Councillor - John Matthissen New parents free tree

Mid Suffolk's popular Tree for Life scheme, which offers a tree for new parents, is open once again for 2022 applications. The scheme is open to all families in the District who have or are welcoming a new born, or newly adopted child, between 1 January and 31 December 2022. Parents who may have lost a child during the same period are also able to apply for a remembrance tree. If you have no space for a tree at home, it can be planted for you on Council land.

Identity Needed to vote in elections

The next local elections will be in May 2023 but **the law is changing**. If you want to vote at a polling station, you will need to prove your identity by showing photo ID. This may be a passport or driving licence, perhaps a student card or other official ID which **must include a photograph.** If you have none of these the District Council will be able to verify your identity and issue a document, but so far, the government has not passed the secondary legislation to say how this will happen.

Voter registration has just started, so you should hear from the council asking for confirmation of people at your address eligible to vote. This includes teenagers 16 years old who will approach voting age during the currency of the new registers.

You can request a postal vote via a form on council web site, or call 0300 1234000

Rising cost of living

The District Council is providing extra support to Citizens Advice and the Food Bank, help for council tenants, and discretionary help with council tax is also available. The focus on wellbeing is being strengthened through social prescribing, discounts on gym and swim admissions and supporting local initiatives.

It helps a lot if you have these separated. Clean pet food pouches and other soft plastic packaging can now be recycled at Tesco, Solar and some other shops. You will need to check who accepts what as Asda don't accept pet food pouches, but Tesco do.

Market Place 9.30am – 11.30am. same items can be accepted, plus now **tetra-paks**, used for fruit juice, long life and soya milk, soup etc. Note these can also be taken to the Household waste site.

MORE THAN ONE STRING TO HER BOW

Sheila Ravenscroft was born and grew up in Shipley, Yorkshire before going to college in Roehampton, London, where she trained to be a chemistry teacher. Once qualified, she taught in a school in north London and stayed there for the whole of her teaching career.

While teaching she met John Ravenscroft (John Peel – renowned broadcaster and DJ) under circumstances she describes as "quite romantic actually". She was at a television recording with other teaching friends, for which they were paid 10 shillings on the proviso they stayed to the end. Sheila recalled it made for really good 'beer money'. John was one of the guest speakers and, having spotted her, he arranged for her to receive a note from him because he had to rush off to a gig at the end of the show. The note contained a phone number and a message asking her to telephone at 11am the next day. It was signed 'Peace and Love'. After much persuasion from friends, she did phone and that was the very beginning of their life together.

They moved to Great Finborough in 1971 and made lots of friends. Learning to drive was essential when they moved here and Sheila wasted no time in doing this. They immersed themselves in the life of the community. They very much wanted to tie the knot in Great Finborough and fought hard but, because John had been married before, the vicar would not allow it. A vicar they knew in the Oval said he would marry them so they organised a coach for all their friends, and kids from the youth club, and were married in London in 1974.

They had started the youth club at Pettiward Hall in 1972 with two other couples but soon its running fell on Sheila's and John's shoulders. The club was a huge success but calling it youth club was unpopular so they dropped it and re-named it 'The Great Finborough International Airport'. Upstairs they had a snooker table. Downstairs was table tennis, a football table and a jukebox.

The club also had a football team that played regularly in a local league. They were members of the Suffolk Association of Youth and joined in

their activities and tournaments. Orienteering in Thetford Forest was one such occasion and they bought a minibus which took the kids as far afield as Birmingham. Their first camping trip was to Beddgelert, North Wales. Sheila remembers listening to the radio in her tent when Watergate erupted. They attended gigs with big bands, obtaining tickets through John's connections - not least of all was Status Quo. One of the regular events organised by the club was on Bonfire Night, held in the field where the water reservoir now is. They set up stalls with food, and lots and lots of people attended. It really was quite a display.

In 1976, with Sheila halfway through her first pregnancy and with 20 youths from the club in a minibus, she recalls their adventures as they drove and camped their way across Europe to the former Yugoslavia. After nearly six years of running the GF International Airport and with 2 small children in tow, it was time to hand over to others. She has the fondest memories of running the youth club and when she meets up with its old members they effuse about how much they loved it.

Late in '76 Sheila, with Hazel from The Old Forge, got elected onto the parish council with the intention of getting the animal waste products processing factory in Valley Lane closed down. The stink was horrendous, she says. In the summer months doors and windows had to kept shut. Lorries delivered their cargo uncovered and waste slopped onto the road. Regularly, the primary school children were not allowed out into the playground because of the stench.

Sheila continued for many years on the parish council and also sat on the Hall Committee and school governing body, eventually becoming chairperson. Parent teacher associations (PTAs) at primary and middle school took up huge chunks of her time, and she became a governor at Combs Middle School. She was fundraising, helping children learn to read, and she organised events. In addition to these commitments and bringing up 4 children, Sheila was unpaid and unofficial personal assistant to John, who worked mainly from home. The word busy in Sheila's case does not describe that time in her life. It is worth a

mention that, when their eldest child started at Finborough Primary School, there were only about 30 pupils.

Sheila had long wanted to learn to play the piano and took lessons from a woman in Woolpit whom she describes as extraordinary. She was enjoying it and doing well when, in 1996, Sheila had a massive brain haemorrhage. This near-death event affected her eyesight very badly and prevented her piano playing permanently. Her piano teacher suggested she join the Tudor Rose choir that she had just started. She helped by highlighting in red her part on the score sheet - a brilliant solution. Sheila joined another two choirs and still sings in the benefice choir (Buxhall) and at Stowmarket Chorale.

Some years after her husband's sudden and untimely death in October 2004, Sheila was asked by the town council if they could use his name as they were planning to open the derelict hall in the centre of Stowmarket as a venue for a variety of cultural events. Having consulted the (now adult) children Sheila agreed with the proviso that this would be the limit of her involvement. A committee was formed to which Sheila was invited. True to form, she became very much involved. 13 or so years later Sheila is still very much involved.

Sheila says she cannot fault Stowmarket Town Council for their speed and support in getting the project going. The John Peel Centre was originally a corn hall where producers sold their corn. It was one building fronting onto the market square. It was made into two premises, with a bank in the front section. In the early '70s the back section was a cinema which then became a pool hall. Once derelict the council used it as storage as did SODS for their costumes and props.

Money was forthcoming for it to pass health and safety requirements; a temporary loo and sink were installed; and they got the electricity working. The basic shell had weeds growing through the concrete floor and broken windows. It was time to get started and put on gigs. With borrowed staging and Sheila buying up beer and coke from Asda to sell from a trestle table, the venue was up and running. Since then, the list of the work to turn it into the venue that was intended is too

long to set down here. There was fundraising, obtaining grants, lottery money and match funding. This work has been going on for over a decade - all done by volunteers. Now, the Centre is just a few weeks away from the building being returned to its original state - opening onto the market square.

Doing her bit does not come close to describing the way in which Sheila Ravenscroft has helped her local community, always looking to improve peoples' experiences. A true example to us all.




