News from your District Councillor - John Matthissen Cost of living crisis

The District Council is aiming to help in various ways: -

- 1) Co-ordinating Government Support to ensure it reaches those people who need it.
- 2) Exercising discretion when providing welfare support and advice to support those people who could potentially fall on hard times.
- 3) Maximise partnership working (Citizens Advice, Food Banks etc)
- 4) Maintain Good Health referrals for mental health support, discounts at our gyms and swimming pools, engaging in community-led "wellbeing" initiatives, volunteering, and socialising via local initiatives.
- 5) Access to food and nutrition healthy eating exercises/initiatives, allotments, possible Community Larder.

Identity Needed to vote in elections

The next local elections will be in May 2023, but **the law is changing**. If you want to vote at a polling station, you will need to prove your identity by showing photo ID. This may be a passport or driving licence, perhaps a student card or other official ID which **must include a photograph**. If you have none of these the District Council will be able to verify your identity and issue a document, but so far, the government has not passed the secondary legislation to say how this will happen. **Voter registration** has just started, so you should hear from the council, possibly by email, asking for confirmation of people at your address eligible to vote. This includes teenagers 16 years old who will approach voting age during the currency of the new registers.

Wash Lane Spinney (land bought by Mid Suffolk DC for biodiversity) Thanks to local volunteers and council staff who have cleared huge quantities of Himalayan Balsam. With a few sharp frosts (hard to imagine as I write!) there should be far less next year. The council will start removing other non-native trees and vegetation over the winter, and I will arrange a visit for the spring. (The land is not intended for regular public use.)

Recycling stalls

Sunday 4 September (First Sunday) Red Gables, Ipswich Street, Stowmarket 2pm-4pm — You can bring medicine 'blister' packs, toothpaste tubes and brushes, cheese wrappers and nets, pens, pencils, and markers. It helps a lot if you have these separated.

Thursday 22nd **September (Fourth Thursday)** Market Place 9.30am – 11.30am. same items can be accepted, plus now **tetra-paks**, used for fruit juice, long life and soya milk, soup etc. Note these can also be taken to the Household waste site.



Turner's Triumphs

Peter Turner was born in Stowmarket in a room now part of the Walnut Tree pub in Violet Hill Road. He went to Stowmarket Secondary Modern School where he freely admits his education was sadly lacking because of his interest in football, cricket and running. The last of these gave him the opportunity to represent Suffolk in an all-England competition in Birkenhead. In 1962, at the age of 15, he joined the Stowmarket Golf Club as a junior member for 2 guineas. Full membership at that time was 9 guineas. It was just a 9-hole course at the time.

When he left school at 15, Peter wanted to go to agricultural college, but his father thought he would be better off at ICI where his father, sister and an uncle worked. His Youth Training Scheme included classes in maths, English, the sciences, and PE. At work, spent three months in each department, where he was assessed. At 18 his Training Officer recommended him for the senior training scheme. During this apprenticeship he achieved silver and gold awards in the Duke of Edinburgh's Award, building on the bronze he obtained whilst in the Boys Brigade. Each year on the Youth Training Scheme he spent 2 weeks on a challenge course in the Lake District and attended Outward Bound in Devon for a month, running to the river Dart in April and jumping in was the compulsory start to the day!

In his second year at ICI his parents moved to Trinidad where his father was technical director of ICI paints. Peter went into 'digs', which he really enjoyed. Trinidad must have had some kind of magnetic attraction for the Turner family. While hobbling around the factory for 4 months with a leg in plaster from a football injury against Felixstowe, he was asked if he would like to go to Trinidad on a 6-month work opportunity which he could not refuse.

Before going to Trinidad, he had dated Pat Champion a couple of times, rekindling that friendship on his return. They married when he was 20 and Pat 18 and they stayed a loving couple for the next 53 years. They moved soon afterwards because Peter's work took him to Slough, where he worked in the Refinish Paint Development Lab. After 3 or 4 years he

was promoted to be a supervisor at the resin plant. They stayed in and around Slough for 12 years, raising 3 children. Peter continued playing football and became an associate player for the Thames Valley Police team. He loved this opportunity to play at a much higher level.

Peter and Pat both missed Suffolk and eventually, taking a drop in salary, they came back to Stowmarket when Peter was 32 years old. Through his endeavours, he became shift manager of the ICI Stowmarket site, having full responsibility for the site outside day hours, until he retired 21 years later. Back in his beloved Suffolk, Peter involved himself in a wide range of activities. Having helped start up a clay pigeon shooting club, an activity he had greatly enjoyed for many years, it continued for 33 years. In the autumn and winter months he worked his dogs, having up to 4 at times. 11 Labradors and 2 spaniels so far. In the spring and summer months he and a friend ran a small decorating business, mostly doing outside work.

Peter Turner is well known in the village, to which they moved in 1996, mainly for his work as a parish councillor. In May 2023, when his term of office ends, he will have been on the parish council for 12 years, chairing it for 4 of them. Being a parish councillor is less about going to meetings and more about taking on responsibility for doing the practical tasks of keeping the village in good shape. Serving on the Garden Club Committee has taken up a fair amount of his time and he took on the role as Chairman after John Davey died in August 2018.

The Pettiward Hall Committee was another commitment of Peter's, uncovering forgotten funds since spent on the refurbishment of the hall, and the much-needed new kitchen. He now sits on the Parochial Church Council. Peter has been instrumental in these roles in the helping to set up the children's play park; the wildflower meadow; the allotments; Woodpecker Hill; getting the church lit up; Speed Watch and speed signs; wild bird food orders and distribution; Open Gardens; and in planting flowers and trees, digging ditches and litter picking. The list goes on and on and he has raised thousands of pounds for charity.

It is the commitment of people like Peter, often unseen and uncelebrated, that keeps our village tidy, the grass cut and lights on. Having sadly lost his wife, Pat, late in 2020, having cared for her so diligently, he continued with his public duties throughout the pandemic. When he steps down from the parish council in 2023, Peter will no doubt turn his attention to other important things in his life, supported by his many friends in the village; and his children, to whom he is very close. A keen gardener, Peter's expertise in growing tomatoes is second to none. Peter is very keen that the village thrives through a strong and dynamic parish council, and he very much hopes that new people will come forward and make a commitment to serve their community as he has done for so many years.

Also, as you know, during the dark days of the pandemic and lock down a number of you found solace in working within the wood for the allocated hour and that, in turn, helped in maintaining some sort of normality for you during that horrible time.

Also, as a note, please remember that going into the wood during days of high wind can be dangerous. The Goat Willow especially is prone to snap and break and the last thing we need is for anyone to be seriously injured.

Finally, may I again thank those of your who took the time in nominating us and hope that our little wood will continue to thrive and be enjoyed by us and those who move to our village in the future.

The M.A.D. award ceremony will be held on 22nd September 2022, Trinity Park, Ipswich.

Letter From Combs Rectory

September is traditionally the month for harvest festivals, and we have four taking place across our benefice this month. The remaining three harvest festivals will take place during October. But why do we have them?

These services in church are a celebration of the food grown on the land and thanksgiving ceremonies and celebrations for a successful harvest are held worldwide and are very ancient. In Britain, we have given thanks for successful harvests since pagan times. We celebrate this day by singing, praying, and decorating our churches with baskets of fruit and food and Christians are reminded of all the good things God gives them. In schools and in churches, people bring food from home to a Harvest Festival Service. After the service, the food that has been put on display is usually made into parcels and given to people in need or, in the case of the Harvest Festival at Buxhall, auctioned off.

The tradition of celebrating Harvest Festival in churches as we know it today began in 1843, when the Reverend Robert Hawker invited parishioners to a special thanksgiving service for the harvest at his church at Morwenstow in Cornwall. Victorian hymns such as "We plough the fields and scatter", "Come ye thankful people, come" and "All things bright and beautiful" helped popularise his idea of harvest festival and spread the annual custom of decorating churches with home-grown produce for the Harvest Festival service.

Charity Golf Day




